A former semi-professional player with Bridlington Town, Dave delivered unprecedented success during his first spell as Beverley Town manager, winning two consecutive Humber Premier League titles and lifting the Northern Counties Senior Cup – becoming one of only two East Riding sides to have done so.

After enjoying spells as manager at Selby Town, Barton Town and twice at Hall Road Rangers, he returned to Norwood in May 2022.

Following his appointment Dave outlined his vision with amazing clarity and accuracy: "I envisage if we do well, the town will back us. This town has been crying out for a NCEL side for the last 20 years and it is a large town in a semi-affluent area so I firmly believe the town will get behind the club and we'll carry on the growth."

He added: "There's some good players around here and I'm fed up of them going to the likes of Brid, Winterton, Brigg, Cleethorpes – let's get the best players from here playing for Beverley. I consider myself to be a Beverlion and I'm proud of it because it is a good place and they deserve what the committee and the players have been able to produce. It is up to myself, my management team and the current group to kick on."


Kick on they have, and on Saturday 11th May Norwood saw one of Beverley's most famous sporting occasions on a magical day where 1,525 people turned out to watch Beverley Town clinch promotion to the NCEL Premier Division following a penalty shoot out.

When asked what has made him successful as a manager, Dave explained: "I have learned from three really good managers – Billy Heath, Pete Daniels and Gary Allanson. It's important to identify your strengths and weaknesses and get the right people in to work with you. I try to find a balance and bring in experts in their field." He added: "I follow a piece of advice I was once given – choose your chairman, not your club. It's important to have a good relationship with them."

One of the people Dave has recruited as a member of his team is another former Longcroft pupil – James Bennett. Dave explained: "James has taken Bishop Burton College to the next level. He's UEFA A qualified with ten years' experience and his coaching ability is superb."

James, who has worked with Dave before and spent time at Hull City, Lincoln City and Darlington as well as a number of local clubs, will undoubtedly be an asset to Beverley Town.

Dave explained: "It's important to remember why you selected the players and to put trust in them. I'm always as positive as possible – even after a defeat. Nothing is personal." Drawing on his extensive experience as a player, Dave added: "I manage how I would want to be managed as a player. It's not one size fits all but it's about judging which players need certain approaches."



Mr Baker said: "Dave was an outstanding player but even in Year 8 as a young player he was an obvious choice as captain of the school team. He demonstrated a mature understanding of the game and how to motivate those around him and his communication skills were excellent. I'm not surprised he enjoyed the playing career he did and that he's moved successfully into management."

While Dave and James are both former Longcroft pupils, many of the current Beverley Town first team are from out of town. Dave explained: "After the play-off final a young supporter asked me, 'How do we get to play for the first team?' I want to create a pathway for young players to come through, and the Reserves will become more of an Under 23 feeder team."



Dave outlined his hopes for the future.

"Short-term – to keep kicking on and to do well next season. Long-term – to secure a pathway for the youth of Beverley to play to the highest level they're capable of."

As mentioned earlier, Dave was an outstanding schoolboy player who went on to enjoy a fantastic career with some of the area's top local clubs. When asked about his greatest achievement as a player, he said: "I captained the Winterton team that beat Hull City at Winterton in front of 1,500." He added: "Rob Northen scored." Rob, who now runs a successful business with his brother Gavin and is still based in Beverley, is another exceptional footballer who captained our school team during his five years as a Longcroft pupil.

Dave said his greatest memories from his years at Longcroft were inter-form matches. "We were always the underdogs, never the best on paper, but we managed to win or be up there. I enjoyed playing with my mates." Someone who has always exhibited a strong desire to win whatever the odds, Dave also recalled fondly games before school in the playground against the older players in the years above which were always tough.

Mr Baker said: "Dave is clearly and rightly highly regarded as someone who is putting Beverley Town on the map. He is highly skilled, commands respect and deserves his success – I'm delighted the future of the town's premier football team is in his hands."

Congratulations to Dave and Beverley Town on everything the club has achieved. We look forward to celebrating more wonderful days in the future!

This week, Year 7 pupils and their parents visited us for our Year 7 Parents' Evening. These are always very positive events, with parents, teachers and pupils celebrating each child's individual strengths and achievements over the past year, and setting personalised targets for the future.

As a school, we enjoy celebrating our children's achievements and discussing progress with parents. The evenings present a great opportunity for discussing where a pupil is already progressing well and, also, where they may be missing opportunities and discussing strategies to aid improvement. Mrs Barry, our Head of Year 7, said: "This year pupils have settled into life at Longcroft School remarkably well, and are upbeat and happy in their lessons and around school." Miss Fox, Year 7 Care and Achievement Co-ordinator said "I enjoy spending time getting the know the pupils as individuals, throughout the school week in many different settings. We see the children thriving, from lesson to lesson, navigating around our school site in a confident way."



The children are enjoying their learning in a range of subjects and creating the foundations of knowledge and skills which will stand them in good stead for later stages of education and careers.

The Mathematics course teaches the children to develop their range of mathematical skills and develop techniques in order to solve problems. All pupils will study the six topic areas, covering number, algebra, ratio and proportion, geometry, probability, and statistics. As well as the technical aspects, mathematical study develops skills such as problem solving, critical thinking and numerical awareness.

I want to highlight how our Lower School children have participated in the UKMT Maths Challenge this year. The UK Mathematics Trust was founded in 1996 with the charitable aim of advancing the education of young people in mathematics. The Trust's biggest competitions are the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Mathematical Challenges, which have over 700 000 entries each year, and are the UK's most popular school competitions. The Junior Mathematical Challenge is a 60-minute, multiple-choice competition aimed at pupils across the UK. It encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. The problems on the Junior Mathematical Challenge are designed to make pupils think. Most are accessible, yet still challenge those with more experience.

We are delighted that this year through Mrs Powell's organisation a group of Lower School were able to take the challenge, and extremely proud of their fantastic results. To recognise the highest performers, the UKMT awards the top-scoring 40% of participants Bronze, Silver and Gold certificates in the ratio 3:2:1. This demonstrates both the level of competition and our pupils' achievements.

Taking a wider view, many employers will ask for a good grade in GCSE Mathematics, even if their daily business doesn't involve a lot of maths. This is because employers value these skills. Being able to solve an equation in algebra can help employees think in a certain way and become better at solving other problems in real life. It really is the case for many careers that GCSE Mathematics is vital. I've enjoyed seeing our Lower School pupils rise to the challenge and work well in their lessons also.

# Nurturing Healthy Relationships and Understanding Consent

Teaching children about healthy relationships and consent is crucial in helping them develop respect for themselves and others. As parents, we play a pivotal role in guiding our children to understand these concepts, which are foundational for building trust and empathy in any relationship.

#### **Understanding Healthy Relationships:**

A healthy relationship, whether it's a friendship or a romantic relationship, is built on several key pillars:

- **1. Respect:** Understanding and accepting differences in opinions, boundaries, and personal spaces.
- 2. Trust: Believing in each other's reliability and having confidence in each other's decisions.
- 3. Honesty: Communicating openly and truthfully without hiding feelings or thoughts.

By fostering an environment where healthy relationships and consent are discussed openly and modelled daily, we empower our children to respect themselves and others. It's never too early to start these conversations, and the benefits will last a lifetime.

A fourth Year 7 pupil Summer also ran in the relay as well as competing in the long jump and 200 metres. She said: "We were chosen because we'd done well in PE. I'd only done the long jump in PE, but I managed 4 metres 10 centimetres. Costello was a good environment to compete in. The track was good, there were no stones or anything, and it was well organised."

Congratulations to Tallulah on her international debut! We look forward to celebrating more of Tallulah's wonderful achievements in the future.




### Harry Read, British D-Day Veteran

Last Thursday, June 6th, marked the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings in Normandy. It was a day to remember the courage and sacrifice of those that served in the armed forces as well as those on the home front, and pay tribute to them.

80 years is a long time. Even though some adults in our community may have ancestors who fought or fell at Normandy, for our young it might be hard to imagine just how momentous D-Day truly was. It is considered the largest amphibious assault in military history and the invasion marked the start of Allied operations that would finally lead to the end of the Second World War

Literature, like art, music theatre, dance and film can help us understand what people went through and how they coped, conquered their fears, and were able to maintain hope in the most testing and terrifying of circumstances.

A unique and important read.






#### Year 10


Set on the eve of D-Day, a riveting tale of courage and optimism. Superb.
