After weeks of campaigning and a morning of voting, the results were announced by Returning Officer Mr Coupe:

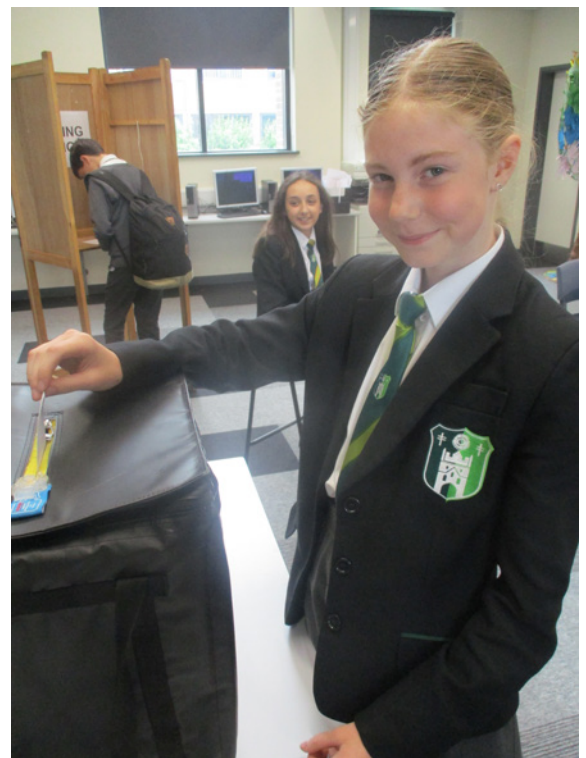
The Conservative Party – 4.40%

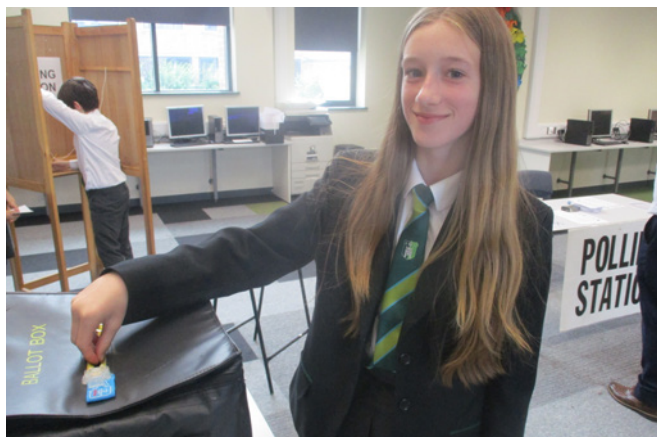
The Yorkshire Party – 14.78%

Beth, who ran as the Labour Party candidate, was duly elected as the Member of Parliament for Longcroft School and Sixth Form College.

Beth, who is in Year 7, said: "It's unexpected - I thought it would be a lot closer but it feels good." Beth was asked to consider the current voting age. "I feel certain 12 year olds should be able to vote, and I would like to, but I definitely think 16 year olds should be able to vote." Beth explained: "I think it's quite an interesting career - stressful but rewarding if you did something well." She added: "I'm interested in politics, which is why I chose to get involved in the Longcroft election."

When asked what she address as an MP, Beth explained: "I would want to sort out the problems with the NHS and the waiting lists for ambulances, and maybe offer more scholarships for university or more help for people who can't afford to go. I'd definitely like to go to university. I'm into music and drama, but I'd maybe study Criminal or Child Psychology." The opportunity formed an important part of this year's Personal Development programme. We recognise the Fundamental British Values in our school, and Democracy is key to this. Thank you to all our children and families for your support throughout this summer term, especially with the recent completion of our GL and STAR Assessments in school. These assessments provide us with invaluable information with respect to pupil progress, and we look forward to sharing our findings with you in the next academic year.

At Longcroft School, we encourage our pupils to always try their hardest in everything they do in every lesson and staff, in turn, recognise and reward not only great work, but great character as well. This system enables teachers to issue a range of rewards to pupils both in class and around school. The rewards are based on the school motto, and are awarded for work demonstrating Great Thought or acts of Great Heart or Great Vision. We also recognise and reward pupils when they display life skills, such as effective communication.

Also, thank you with your support in monitoring your child's progress in school daily on our ClassCharts App. We strongly believe that parents and carers have a crucial role in recognising and rewarding our pupils' achievements. We therefore encourage parents and carers to download the free ClassCharts Parent App from either iStore or Google Play. We have previously provided each parent or carer with a unique access code for their child, which needs to be entered along with an email address and password. Parents and carers can then check their child's rewards regularly on their mobile phone. If you cannot find the letter with the unique code, please contact school@longcroft.eriding.net and we will be happy to help. A reminder; any points accumulated on ClassCharts can be traded in for items in our school's ClassCharts store online. We can confirm the system will remain in place for next academic year.

With one week left, I have enjoyed talking to our Lower School pupils during their lunch and break times about the trips and activities they are planning to do during their well-earned summer holiday.



I have also tried to share with them the secret of how to make the holidays last longer; the key is to fill the holiday with a wide range of new experiences. Studies have shown that the human mind 'skips' time when experiencing familiar surroundings or whilst taking part in familiar activities. Time seems to actually 'slow down' when doing something new and different. The key to making the most of the summer holiday is therefore to fill it with as many different sights, sounds and experiences as possible. The same could be said of a day at secondary school!

Although our pupils are in only five 60-minute lessons per day, they are surrounded by different teachers, sights, sounds and experiences in that time. England Expects, and Longcroft Provides!

Congratulations to rugby league players Will Hutchinson and Jack Charles who represented England's Academy team against France at Warrington's Halliwell Jones Stadium last week.

Both Jack and Will are professional players with Hull FC, and represented Yorkshire last season. Jack, who played scrum-half, also made his England debut last season, while hooker Will made representing his country one of his goals for 2024.

Mr Cassidy coached Jack and Will throughout their years at Longcroft. He said: "Both Jack and Will were a pleasure to coach. Jack has already played several first team games this season and done exceptionally well. Will is making outstanding progress – he set his goals high at the start of this season after an impressive 2023 and he's achieving them."

While England's Academy is an Under 18 team, many of the French players were a year older. Both Will and Jack were heavily involved in a high scoring game which the French won 40-37 with a last-minute try from Avignon winger Baptiste Pourchi.

Mr Baker said: "I was so proud to see two players from Longcroft in the same England team. Both Jack and Will are incredibly dedicated and it was great to see them combining so well on the field for their country, just as they did only a couple of years ago when they were playing for Longcroft. It's fantastic that two of the best seventeen Under 18 players in the country went to Longcroft, and they were joined by another Beverley player in centre Ryan Westerman who also plays for Hull FC."

Mr Cassidy added: "The skill level on display was impressive – it was a fast, open game and Jack and Will were heavily involved. They've both got bright futures in the game."







Morgan on track for success!

Congratulations to former pupil Morgan l'Anson Bradley who is making tremendous progress as a student at the National Horseracing College.

Morgan received the 'On Track 4 Racing' award in recognition of her hard work and commitment during the Foundation Course.

Lee Newton, Lead Training Instructor, said: "Having joined the college having had no previous experience of handling or riding thoroughbred racehorses, Morgan overcame some early riding setbacks and is now capable of riding many different horses that present her with a variety of challenges. She is now happy to ride any horse she is asked to and this has allowed her to improve into a very competent and confident rider both whilst in the indoor school and out on the gallops."



Lee added: "She also always shows an excellent work ethic and completes her yard tasks to both industry standards and time scales. She should be very proud of her achievements."

The award is given to the learner who shows the following qualities: punctuality; reliability; respect for themselves and others; accountability; professionalism; the ability to work with a degree of independence and good horse-handling skills. In addition, the learner is expected to consistently demonstrate the ability to work with racehorses at least as effectively as is expected at that point in the course.



A very proud parent, Morgan's mum explained: "It's a nice story behind how it all came about really, as there was an organised trip in the village where we live for a day out at Pontefract Races and Morgan came along with us....and then she got chatting to the jockeys and stable hands and that was basically the day she discovered what she wanted to be! She just said to me a few days after I really don't know what to do because I want to be one of those girls that looks after the race horses! So we just started looking into it all and found the National Horseracing College in Doncaster. She's just well and truly thrived!"

Morgan has earned an apprenticeship at Kevin Frost Racing, set in beautiful countryside near Newark on the border of Nottinghamshire and Lincolnshire. The yard has in the past been home to several successful trainers, including Mick Appleby.

Mrs Ellis said: "I'm so proud of Morgan. It's always lovely to hear how former pupils are doing and Morgan's is a wonderful success story. She's working hard but loving what she's doing and I can't wait to hear more about her progress."

Brett Bakes for Books

Well done to Year 10 pupil Brett, who did his work experience in the library. As well as developing his library and information skills, Brett also organised a bake sale to raise extra funds for more Manga books and graphic novels in the school library.

“I love print fiction, but sometimes when I’m reading a good graphic novel or manga, I find myself envying those who work in an illustrated format.” —Jane Lindskold

Brett knows how popular they are:

“A lot of the books I wanted to read were on loan, so I thought we should get some more. A good way to raise money is through bake sales and I’m quite good at baking.”

Why does Brett enjoy Manga so much?

“The stories are really interesting, more intense than other books. I’ve learnt a lot about the Japanese culture.

The art style is nice to look at too. It helps me imagine what is happening better. I like the fact the text is spread out, so it’s easier to read.”

The increase in readership of Manga has risen dramatically over the last few years, in part because of how mainstream they have become in pop culture. However, some educationalists still don’t regard them as true literature or capable of promoting literacy skills in the same way as text only books. Thankfully, such misconceptions are receding.

Reading Manga can be a really visually engaging and immersive experience and great for reluctant readers or those who struggle with blocks of text they find stressful. The art makes it more accessible and helps push the story along. Thus, the reader has a visual and literary experience that when combined with sound effects (onomatopoeia) is multimodal and can promote a healthier reading habit for some. A multimodal approach is especially useful for those with ASD.



Another benefit is Manga encourages readers to connect with different cultures, and explore themes and ideas in an easily comprehensible way. Most importantly they are exciting and great fun for all ages, including adults.

On the final day of his work experience in the library Brett researched all the Manga books on Accelerated Reader and sourced copies online, comparing prices between publishers. We look forward to seeing a selection of his choices in the library in September.

Frank Cottrell-Boyce is appointed as new children's laureate

Frank Cottrell-Boyce has just been appointed as the new children's laureate. He believes that reading is a foundation of happiness and is a great advocate for young readers.

Mr Cottrell-Boyce, an award-winning screenwriter as well as a children's author, is the 13th children's laureate since 1999. The role was introduced by the reading charity BookTrust, who we work with annually on the Bookbuzz project. Previous laureates have included Michael Morpurgo, Malorie Blackman, and Julia Donaldson. Each laureate champions a project of their choice. Cottrell-Boyce, wants to **'encourage, facilitate, and agitate on behalf of the youngest readers.'**

At his laureate speech he described the enjoyment of reading as an **'invisible privilege that those who have it don't think about – harder to read than other outward signs of poverty but just as real.'**

We wish Frank Cottrell-Boyce the very best of success. He will be a marvellous champion of reading for our young. You can find a selection of his books in the school library.

Would You Like To Be A Parish Councillor And Help To Make The Parish Of Molescroft A Better Place To Live?

There are currently four councillor vacancies on Molescroft Parish Council.

The council can now fill these vacancies by co-option, a process whereby the council considers applications from interested persons and can then select people to fill the seats.

We are looking for individuals with energy and passion, who want to make a positive difference and give back to their local community.

The work of a councillor can be extremely rewarding. If you are interested in becoming a parish councillor, please write to the parish council and include details of why you would like to apply, together with the skills and experience that you feel you would bring to the role.

If you wish to apply, require any further information about qualification for being a councillor, or just want more information about the role, please contact Laura George, Clerk to the Council, on clerk@molescroft-pc.gov.uk

To stand for election or co-option to become a parish councillor you must be:

At least 18 years old on the day of your nomination, and A British citizen, an eligible Commonwealth citizen or a citizen of any member state of the European Union You must also meet at least one of the following four qualifications: You are, and will continue to be, registered as a local government elector for the parish in which you wish to stand from the day of your nomination onwards; You have occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the parish area during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election; Your main or only place of work during the 12 months prior to the day of your nomination and the day of election has been in the parish area; You have lived in the parish area or within three miles of it during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election. Disqualifications from standing: There are certain people who are disqualified from being elected to a parish or community council in England and Wales. You cannot be a candidate if, at the time of your nomination and on the day of the election, any of the following are true: You are employed by the parish council or hold a paid office under the parish/community council (including joint boards or committees), You are the subject of a bankruptcy restrictions order or interim order, You have been sentenced to a term of imprisonment of three months or more (including a suspended sentence), without the option of a fine, during the five years before polling day and the ordinary period allowed for making an appeal or applications in respect of the conviction has passed. A person who is in the process of making an appeal or application in relation to the conviction is not disqualified at any time before the end of the day on which the appeal or application is disposed of, abandoned, or fails by reason of non-prosecution, you have been disqualified under the Representation of the People Act 1983 (which covers corrupt or illegal electoral practices). The disqualification for an illegal practice begins from the date the person has been reported guilty by an election court or convicted and lasts for three years. The disqualification for a corrupt practice begins from the date a person has been reported guilty by an election court or convicted and lasts for five years, unless at any time within that period a court determines that the conviction should not be upheld, in which case the disqualification ends at that time, You are subject to the notification requirements of or under Part 2 of the Sexual Offences Act 2003, and the ordinary period allowed for making an appeal or application in respect of the order or notification has passed. A disqualification set under s.81A of the Local Government Act 1972 will only apply to a person who is subject to any relevant notification requirements or relevant order made on or after 28 June 2022. A person who is in the process of making an appeal or application in relation to the disqualification is not disqualified at any time before the end of the day on which the appeal or application is disposed of, abandoned, or fails by reason of non-prosecution. A person may also be disqualified from being or becoming a member of certain authorities following a conviction under the Localism Act 2011. The full range of disqualifications is complex and if you are in any doubt about whether you are disqualified, you must do everything you can to check that you are not disqualified before submitting your nomination papers. You must be sure that you are not disqualified as you will be asked to sign one of the required nomination papers to confirm that you are not disqualified. It is a criminal offence to make a false statement on your nomination papers as to your qualification for being elected, so if you are in any doubt, you should contact your employer, consult the legislation or, if necessary, take your own independent legal advice. The Returning Officer will not be able to confirm whether or not you are disqualified.
