Over recent years the school has gone from strength to strength, leading to a sustained improvement in standards and outcomes as well as hugely increased demand for places. Last year the school, which had already been described as one of the 'most improved in the country' by the Department for Education, received further external validation from Ofsted Inspectors who described the excellent education that is now being provided.

Headteacher Mr Perry said: "We are so proud of all our pupils who have seen their hard work and determination pay off. We know many will head into our Sixth Form College, which celebrated great success, while others will be exploring a range of wider options across the region. We wish them all every success. We must not underestimate how challenging the secondary educational experience has been for these young people, nor the significant shadow cast by the COVID-19 pandemic. They have shown tremendous courage, character and fortitude."

Liv earned an incredible 9 Grade 9s at GCSE. She said: "I am absolutely thrilled with my results. I can't believe I have done so well. 

Longcroft holds Safeguarding at the very heart of everything we do. We approach safeguarding by making sure that everyone provides a safe environment in which children can learn. This includes, having a curriculum to promote safety and ensuring the correct documents, policies, procedures and records are in place. Additionally, we believe that staff knowledge of the indicators of abuse and neglect is critical.

Without these elements, safeguarding will be ineffective, just as it will if we fail to act on early signs of abuse and neglect in a professional way, do not share information, or do not listen to what children tell us. Even if children, young people and adults say they feel safe, we are fully aware that we must keep asking ourselves whether they are safe. The truth is that we do not know, which is why we take every step to develop a culture that is as safe as possible.

We embed this culture by:

- Recognising that anyone can become a perpetrator, regardless of faith, religion, background, or gender.
- Being aware of school related issues and trends, along with knowledge of concerns in the wider community.
- Being confident of reporting safeguarding (or potential safeguarding) concerns and respecting the importance of confidentiality.
- Never turning away from a difficult, controversial, embarrassing topic or conversation at our school.
- Discussing concerns sensibly, with maturity and consideration.
- >> Speaking to the right people to seek advice and

support.

Acknowledging that safeguarding is everyone's responsibility and working as a team to prevent, protect and take action.

Any concerns are passed through the members of staff who are trained as 'Designated Child Protection Officers' in school in compliance with the 'sharing of information' quidance.

If as a parent you have any concerns please contact your child's Care and Achievement Co-ordinator in the first instance. Their telephone numbers are published at the end of this Newsletter.

If your concern is about a child in immediate danger contact the police on 999. If you have a different concern relating to another adult or child you can contact the East Riding Safeguarding Partnership Hub:




The Bookbuzz Books Are Here!

Every year, thanks to the generosity of the Friends of Longcroft School, we participate in the Bookbuzz reading programme and welcome our new Year 7s with a free book to take home. Along with their library induction, Bookbuzz is a fabulous way of introducing pupils to the school library and encouraging them to read for pleasure from the onset of their new school life.

Bookbuzz was initiated by BookTrust, the UK's largest children's reading charity, and is designed to encourage pupils to value reading, learn more about authors, publishing, discuss titles, and to make independent choices. Pupils are treated to a film in which writers and publishers introduce their books. They also get to listen to extracts, discuss book blurbs, the value of covers, the power of a good opening, and examine all the books from the Bookbuzz display. It's fun and motivating.

Pupils have a choice of 16 titles to pick from. They range from non-fiction reads for inquisitive minds to thrilling fast-paced fiction and cater for a range of abilities and include dyslexia-friendly formats. 

The novel is set in contemporary Edinburgh, a beautiful backdrop to this fabulous tale of Hidden Folk!






Code Name Kingfisher by Liz Kessler

Murder at Snowfall by Fleur Hitchcock


Can Ruby and Lucas solve the murder? Who is the culprit?
