The boys certainly enjoyed their first match in Longcroft's colours

Kai said: "I enjoyed it. I played centre. It was my first game for the school, but I've played before. I used to play for Beverley Braves." Cobie who scored twice on his Longcroft debut, recently represented the City of Hull and District West Hull Under 11's at Hull KR's Sewell Group Craven Park. Mr Baker explained: "Generations of Cobie's family have attended Longcroft and rugby certainly runs in his family - not least his uncle Craig who we featured in our Newsletter last term following his success coaching Beverley RUFC but also one of Hull FC's all-time greats."

Cobie, who played alongside a number of the Sirius West team at Craven Park, said: "I started playing in the Under 9's at Beverley Braves. I also play rugby union – I started the year after. In rugby league I play scrum half, loose forward or centre. I prefer scrum half because you get the ball more and I can run or pass. I enjoyed playing at Craven Park and thought I played well."



Cobie added: "I've enjoyed Longcroft so far. My favourite subject is Maths. I play darts with my dad which helps me to add and subtract quickly with high numbers. I also like PE with Mr Cassidy."



When asked about some of the former Longcroft players he one day hopes to emulate, Cobie said: "I've seen Scott Taylor play but never met him, but I've met Jack Charles. I was taking a picture of the St Helens players and he was standing with them." Mr Baker recalled that Cobie's uncle Craig had also supported St Helens, for some reason! Cobie explained: "My family like St Helens, so I do. Craig got me into rugby in the first place because we were throwing and kicking the ball to each other and he asked if I wanted to play." He added: "My dad watches all my rugby league games. He said I'd played well on Friday. My grandad was also there and he said "Well done". I scored two tries – both were quite long range. One was from inside my own half. Speed is my best strength in my game."

Cobie hopes to progress in the game: "I want to play well all the time – consistent good games. Hopefully then I'll get scouted for a good side like Hull FC."

Mr Baker said: "I remember Cobie's uncle Craig playing his first match for Longcroft on the same pitch back in 1996. Craig went on to enjoy success in both codes of rugby and last season coached Beverley RUFC to success in the Papa Johns Counties 1 North Shield Final, so Cobie has a fantastic role model and I know they're close. Cobie's dad Jamie is a great supporter of his son, as is grandad Martyn – both were at Friday's game."

Craig said: "I'm incredibly proud of him and his rugby journey so far."

Mr Baker added: "While Cobie enjoys great support from his family his Great-Granduncle Brian, who also attended Longcroft, is someone he can really aspire to emulate. Brian, who was signed from Beverley RUFC in 1967, is Hull FC's ninth highest appearance maker of all-time, making 410 appearances in his 15-year spell with the club. A one-club man and a former captain between 1975 and 1978, Brian also scored 107 tries and is one of only five players in the club's history to top 400 appearances and 100 tries."



During his Hull career, Brian became Hull's regular stand-off. He won a

Yorkshire Cup winner's medal in 1969, a Player's No. 6 runners up medal in 1976 when underdogs Hull FC pushed Widnes close, and was a member of the 'Invincibles' team of 1978/9 which won all 26 of their league matches as Hull FC returned to the First Division prior to the glory days of the early 1980's. The highlight of Brian's career was yet to come, however. He explained, "The highlight was the 1980 final at Wembley – playing in a stadium known around the world. I'd retired because my normal everyday job was meaning I couldn't play, but I carried on training. The coach asked if I could help because they'd got some injuries and I ended up playing at Wembley."

Mr Cassidy said: "I am looking forward to seeing how the latest group of players progress. We train each Wednesday and they have great potential. We've had some fantastic teams over the years and several boys have gone on to play professionally. Scott Taylor went to Hull KR then won every honour in the game with Wigan and Hull FC and played for



England. Jack Charles established himself in Hull FC's first team last season and has been joined in the squad for 2025 by Will Hutchinson. Both Jack and Will have represented England Academy. Sam Bowring was in the same team as Scott and is still playing professionally, and several boys have played Academy and Reserveteam rugby at Hull FC and Hull KR. I'm very proud to have coached them all."

Mr Baker added: "The players definitely benefit from having a coach with Mr Cassidy's experience to guide them both on and off the field. A former Hull FC player and Great Britain Under 21 international, he spent time on the coaching staff at Penrith Panthers in Australia – I know players such as Jack and Scott really valued his guidance and still keep in touch."

It is great to see another crop of talented boys coming through with the qualities reminiscent of successful players and teams from years gone by — we look forward to reporting on their progress and achievements as individuals and as a team both this season and in the years to come.

There were a number of sessions which are highlighted in this week's Upper School article including academic support and preparation as well as managing health and well-being. It was another hugely positive night for our school and I would like to thank all those who attended. We were able to share the evidence we have generated from within our own school, alongside the research that more widely informs our practice, to highlight the strategies, routines and mindset that have led to great success for our children over recent years. Every moment matters, and it was wonderful to see so many of our families committing at this early stage of their GCSE journey to focus on doing the right things consistently well from the outset in order to achieve.

#### **CAREER OF THE WEEK: Architect**

#### What does an architect do?

An architect designs new buildings or alterations/extensions to existing buildings. They work on a range of developments, from individual buildings to large scale redevelopment schemes. They also work on the restoration and conservation of older properties. They may even be involved in the design of the surrounding landscapes and spaces.



Architects usually control a project from start to finish and work with several different construction professionals, including surveyors, project managers and engineers. They also work closely with clients and users, making sure that their designs match the requirements, are functional, safe and economical, and increasingly, are environmentally friendly.

#### What can I expect to earn as an architect?

According to the <u>RIBA Jobs Salary Guide 2023</u> the average salary for an architectural assistant, whilst they are studying, is between £22,560 and £28,134. Upon qualification this rises to an average of £35,000 and with 5+ years of experience this increases to an average of £41,489. A salaried partner or director in an architectural practice can expect to earn on average £63,000. In the largest practices some earn over £200,000!

#### What subjects should I study to become an architect?

You will generally require qualifications in arts or humanities and math or science to become an architect. Useful subjects include maths, physics, art and design.

#### How can I start my career as an architect?

The typical route to becoming an architect involves five years studying a recognised course at university and completion of a minimum of two years' practical experience. You can also study part-time, study whilst working in an architectural practice through RIBA Studio or through the new apprenticeship route.

The title 'architect' is protected by law. Once you have completed your qualification and practical experience you will need to apply to register as an architect with the <u>Architects Registration Board</u>.

#### Here in the Sixth Form, I believe it is more important than ever to provide students with choices for the future.

I have been reviewing our curriculum and I am delighted that since September we have been offering a wider range of courses than ever before, in collaboration with our Woldgate centre.

It has been the highlight of my week spending time in the Year 11 assembly having conversations with pupils about their futures and fantastic that so many are choosing The East Yorkshire Sixth Form. I am next going into more assemblies with my Year 12 students to discuss further with pupils how their choices for Post-16 need to be considered carefully to ensure they can access their ambitious futures. Below is a set of questions to consider when looking at course options.

#### How to make the right decisions for post-16 qualifications

There are a lot of considerations to take into account when selecting post-16 qualifications and it should be a decision you put careful thought and time into.

#### What type of qualification should I choose?

It is important to consider what type of qualification will suit you best. BTEC and Cambridge Technical qualifications are vocational, which means they are more directly linked to specific careers and industries. These qualifications are assessed mainly through coursework which you complete as you learn, with some exams. A Level qualifications are more theoretical and enable an in-depth study of a particular subject. One of the fantastic things about our Sixth Form is that you can study either all A Level or all BTEC qualifications, or you can study a combination of BTECs and A Levels, giving you enormous flexibility in your choices.







#### What subjects should I choose?

The first thing you should think about is whether you have a specific idea of what career or degree you wish to continue onto after the Sixth Form. For certain careers, such as medicine or engineering, there are particular subjects you will need to study to enable you to train in that profession. If you are unsure at this stage what career or degree you want to go onto, which is the case for most of our young people, then we would advise you to select subjects you find most interesting, that you enjoy and are good at, while aiming to keep some breadth in your subject choices to keep your options open longer term. I will be offering regular appointments to Year 11 pupils throughout this year to make sure they receive independent advice and guidance about their post-16 qualifications.

#### What else should I be thinking about?

What else do you want to get out of the Sixth Form during the next two years? Of course you will want to leave with fantastic qualifications, but you will also want to have plenty of other opportunities for development. We offer a huge range of enrichment opportunities, including our incredible expedition abroad which is a life-changing experience for our young people. You will also be given leadership, sporting, enterprise and super-curricular opportunities, such as becoming one of our Sixth Form Ambassadors or competing in the UK Maths Challenge These opportunities are about you growing as an individual, but also giving you the edge as you move on from the Sixth Form to your chosen career or degree.

The Sixth Form Team are available for discussions on courses and futures, and we encourage any prospective students and parents to get in touch.

Former student Scott Taylor has returned to rugby league having been appointed head coach of Goole Vikings.

The Vikings, who are based at the town's Victoria Pleasure Grounds, have been accepted into League 1 from the 2025 season having successfully applied for a licence to join the professional tiers of the sport.



The Vikings will become the first ever professional sports club in the East Yorkshire region, outside of the Kingston Upon Hull boundary, in what will be a significant boost for the area.

Goole is already at the centre of a multi-million pound regeneration project, of which sport will play a key role, with the Vikings home ground set to undergo a £7 million redevelopment next year.

Scott, who won every honour in the domestic game during a career that took in spells at Hull KR, Wigan, Salford and Hull FC and represented his country, joins the Vikings at an exciting time for the club. He explained:: I'm very excited - over the moon now everything's out there. I've been looking forward to it. I knew it was the team for me and I'm backing myself to do a good job. I had other options but this really stood out for me. It was all about rugby first and taking the first step on the coaching ladder."

Scott has experience as a coach, having worked for several years as head coach of Beverley's National League team. Mr Cassidy, who coached Scott throughout his years at Longcroft, said: "Scott will bring more than experience to the role – he has tremendous enthusiasm and excellent communication skills as well as a wide range of contacts at all levels of the game. I'm looking forward to seeing how his coaching career develops and will undoubtedly be spending some time watching Goole Vikings next season."






Sue will be visiting Longcroft Library on Friday October 11th to talk to a selection of Year 9 pupils about her writing journey and discuss CALM

I read it from cover to cover, completely absorbed by Baker's superb storytelling, and the tense and terrifying journey of its two main protagonists, Owyn and Tiegan, as they battle a fierce regime in a bid for freedom.

In order to maintain control the state has interfered with the water supply and water, the liquid of life, has become the elixir of docility. Joy, expression, and creativity have been replaced by apathy, indifference and cruelty.

The Servants, the state's enforcers, are everywhere, watching and spying, but a brave few, the Resistors, refuse to drink the nation's water, spurred on by the promise of mass Resistance.

Echoes of Orwell's 1984 are counterbalanced by scenes of tenderness, with grief and loss pitched against hope and perseverance. One of the best Young Adult books I've read for a long time! I can't recommend it enough.
