Headteacher's Welcome

As we move towards the Christmas break, there is much to look forward to and be excited for. This has been a term of many achievements for our community and we will be celebrating them whole-heartedly over the final week of term.

Attendance is singularly the most important indicator of

educational outcomes, with those pupils and students who achieve over 95% significantly more likely to achieve well in examinations and progress to their preferred options when they leave school either at 16 or 18. However, as we have shared many times, the benefits for young people of attending school well are not simply linked to grades or academic performance. Preparing our children for life in the modern world is a core function of our work at Longcroft. This includes, of course, fostering a broad range of knowledge and skills from a carefully considered curriculum, including a focus on personal development and careers. It also, however, involves nurturing positive relationships, communication and friendship. Being exposed to different perspectives, experiences and interactions that promote social and cultural capital builds confidence and security in who we are as beautifully unique individuals, each with a special space and place in the world. It therefore makes me incredibly proud to see 100% attendance for Year 11 pupils at the start of this week, following on from Year 7 hitting the same heights just a short time ago. The difference that being in school regularly makes is immeasurable and profound and the amazing commitment of our young people and families to making the very most of the educational opportunities available to them is truly wonderful to see. Well done to all!

In our headline article this week you will see the amazing efforts of our community in responding to this year's charity fundraising appeal. Our Age UK shoe box campaign is targeted within the local community at elderly people who are living alone and with limited contact with the outside world. These are members of our wider community that have become isolated from any support network, family etc and for whom receiving a special gift at Christmas and a message in a card, is incredibly powerful. The response from our young people and families has been fantastic and after filling every box we could find we

were also able to donate a stack of extra items to support the charity in their work. Reading some of the messages in cards was really emotional and exemplifies the great reservoir of kindness and compassion our school and children provide. Another great example of our Great Heart.

Next week there will be lots taking place to celebrate our fabulous term and recognise the festive season, so do look out for messages and updates. A couple of key reminders include:

Personal, social, and health education (PSHE) is an important part of our Longcroft curriculum; it supports children and young people in developing the skills and knowledge they need to thrive in life. Our PSHE programme is developed with personal development in mind; PSHE helps children learn how to manage their lives, make informed decisions, and stay safe. Looking to the future, the topics

guide children to prepare for the challenges and opportunities they'll face in the future, such as applying for their first job. Recently, our Key Stage 3 pupils have been looking at a range of careers and the requisite skills necessary in securing jobs in these areas.

Recently, I had the pleasure of visiting our Year 9s during tutor time and watching their sessions on writing effective Curriculum Vitae. Pupils could articulate the important of the sessions well, highlighting desirable traits required for different careers. It was interesting to discuss with some of the pupils what their planned career trajectory already looked like, children articulating well what next steps were required and the courses they would need to do in further education. I enjoyed discussing engineering with Alex, as we teach the Engineering option in our Physics A-Level. At Longcroft, we have a proud history of sending pupils to University with high level qualifications, many of our students go on to read Engineering at degree level.



PSHE also encourages open communication about mental health, which can help break the stigma. Going forward, we are promoting resilience and giving children the ability to be confident and supportive human beings. Pupils can identify the importance of support networks and what effective community building looks like.



PSHE helps children form positive attitudes and beliefs about friendships, feelings and ultimately to achieve their academic potential, enhancing the personal, social, emotional and economic wellbeing and happiness of each young person.

Not only is it key practice for our children, but these assessments inform our staff to target their teaching, support and intervention over the remaining weeks before the summer. It is a remarkably busy fortnight at the end of the first term for Key Stage 4 pupils. Year 11 have been in their mock exams, and great focus and effort has been shown by pupils. It has been fantastic to see pupils grow in confidence when coming out of the mocks with feelings of progress and improvement. The intention of the mock exams is twofold - to ensure pupils understand the expectations of the course they are studying, their strengths and areas for development, and rehearsing the process to demonstrate their skills under realistic, timed conditions. Reflection on their learning and mocks is key to success in the final push, and pupils will be carrying on with their work on the GCSE Mindset in form time to support this.

Year 10 pupils have the first of the drop-down days for two of their option choices over the final fortnight of term. Pupils have spent this Wednesday in their subject all day to allow time to complete extended pieces of work and learning.

To celebrate achievements and effort at this time of year we invite pupils to a celebration event on the last day. Pupils that have been showing significant effort in school and at home through apps such as GCSEPod deserve recognition for this. Hardworking Year 11 pupils will be rewarded with a visit to the local cinema, with the those really pushing themselves in Year 10 joining them. CAREER OF THE WEEK: Police Officer

What does a police officer do?

Police officers are responsible for upholding law and order, preventing and investigating crimes, and protecting the public. It is a challenging and fulfilling career, which demands a high level of personal integrity and involves working closely with the local community.



There are clearly defined ranks in the police service which you can move through with experience as well as taking additional examinations. There are opportunities to specialise in a particular type of policing, for example criminal investigation department (CID), anti-fraud, road traffic, drugs, firearms, counter terrorism, air support, underwater search, dog-handling or mounted policing. With experience, you may be able to apply for promotion to sergeant, inspector or chief inspector.

What can I expect to earn as a police officer?

In 2024/25 salaries for police constables start at £29,907, rising to £48,231. The salary for a Sergeant is £51,408 to £53,943, for an Inspector £61,197 to £66,201, for a Chief Inspector £67,509 to £70,200, for a Superintendent £80,784 to £95,025, and for a Chief Superintendent £99,612 to £111,117.

What subjects should I study to become a police officer?

The minimum education requirement for joining the police is a Level 3 Qualification. The government defines this as the equivalent of 2 A Levels or an advanced technical certificate or diploma.

How can I start my career as a police officer?

There are various entry route options into policing, these include the <u>Police Constable Degree</u> Apprenticeship, the <u>IPLDP and Police Constable Entry Programme</u>, the <u>Degree Holder Entry Programme</u>, the <u>Detective Degree Holder Entry Programme</u>, the <u>Professional Policing Degree Holder</u>, and <u>Police Now Graduate Programmes</u>

To join the police force, in general you need to be over 18 (you can apply at 17 and start work when you turn 18), be a British citizen, an EC/EEA national or a Commonwealth citizen or foreign national with no restrictions on your stay in the United Kingdom, have lived in the UK for the last 3 years, be in good health, including fitness and eyesight, and have no criminal record, although some offences may be considered by individual forces when you apply.

You could get a taste of what it is like to work for the police by volunteering as a special constable, working as a police support volunteer or by joining the volunteer police cadets (if you're aged between 13 and 18).

It has been the highlight of my week spending time in the Year 11 canteen having conversations with pupils about their futures and fantastic that so many are choosing the East Yorkshire Sixth. I have also been into a recent assembly to discuss further with Year 11 how their choices for KS5 need to be considered carefully to ensure they can access their ambitious futures. Our Sixth Form also had a stall at the fabulous careers event.

Below is a set of questions to consider when looking at course options.

How to make the right decisions for post-16 qualifications

There are a lot of considerations to take into account when selecting post-16 qualifications and it should be a decision you put careful thought and time into.

What type of qualification should I choose?

It is important to consider what type of qualification will suit you best. BTEC qualifications are vocational, which means they are more directly linked to specific careers and industries. These qualifications are assessed mainly through coursework which you complete as you learn, with some exams. A Level qualifications are more theoretical and enable an in-depth study of a particular subject. One of the fantastic things about our Sixth Form is that you can study either A Level or BTEC qualifications, or you can study a combination of BTECs and A Levels, giving you enormous flexibility in your choices.







What subjects should I choose?

The first thing you should think about is whether you have a specific idea of what career or degree you wish to continue onto after the Sixth Form. For certain careers, such as medicine or engineering, there are particular subjects you will need to study to enable you to train in that profession. If you are unsure at this stage what career or degree you want to go onto, which is the case for most of our young people, then we would advise you to select subjects you find most interesting, that you enjoy and are good at, while aiming to keep some breadth in your subject choices to keep your options open longer term. We will be offering regular appointments to Year 11 pupils throughout this year to make sure they receive independent advice and guidance about their post-16 qualifications.

What else should I be thinking about?

What else do you want to get out of the Sixth Form during the next two years? Of course, you will want to leave with fantastic qualifications, but you will also want to have plenty of other opportunities for development. We offer a huge range of enrichment opportunities, including our incredible expedition abroad which is a life-changing experience for our young people. You will also be given leadership, sporting, enterprise and super-curricular opportunities, such as becoming one of our Sixth Form Student Ambassadors or competing in the UK Mathematics Trust Challenge. These opportunities are about you growing as an individual, but also giving you the edge as you move on from the Sixth Form to your chosen career or degree.



A finale of Shakin Stevens' hit 'Merry Christmas Everyone' brought the curtain down on a fabulous evening of festive entertainment.






We all know that good things come in small packages, but actually writing a story in just six words, that conveys meaning and depth, is not easy! It's all about leaving something out for your reader to work out, creating an atmosphere; asking questions.

This year staff were particularly struck by Henrik's story about making popcorn. It has a dark undercurrent. Why does the narrator hear gunfire? Why has a fun activity become sinister? Has the narrator experienced some trauma in the past? Were they under siege or in a battle that has left them with PTSD?





Alisa's story is very different. It's reference to Ring a Ring o' Roses is clever, and gives it a historical context but the story can be interpreted in a number of different ways. This is also true of Mary's story, which again prompts several questions and has a strikingly chilling atmosphere. What has happened between the two people in the past?

Mary and the Hyenas:

A World Première Honouring Mary Wollstonecraft at Hull Truck

Maureen Lennon, Longcroft's Writer in Residence, has a new play opening at Hull Truck Theatre in February. Mary and the Hyenas takes you on an astonishing journey through the life of British writer, feminist, and philosopher Mary Wollstonecraft.
