As our fantastic teacher volunteers worked in the Trading Pit, pupils bought and sold stocks as the market changed. Radio announcements, newspaper, and information posters meant pupils needed to do their research before making an investment. Pupils were seen shaking with excitement after shares increased in value, and groups cheered and celebrated as companies went bankrupt after they had already sold their shares!"







Mr Perry said: "What a fabulous event. The excitement was palpable and the pupils were completely immersed in the time that I was able to enjoy being in the room. It really was impressive."

Last week, our Year 8 pupils took part in an exciting Trading Game; a fantasy stock market task that allowed them to apply real-world financial concepts in a fun and engaging way. Over the course of the challenge, pupils demonstrated impressive skills in decision-making, research, and teamwork.

Participants researched companies, tracked stock prices, and made strategic investments based on market trends—learning how to navigate volatility and maximise returns. ## I am delighted to feature artwork completed by Year 9 pupil Luke Chadwick.










### Firstly, congratulations to the Year 11 netball team who played their last ever netball tournament last week.

With only six school weeks until the first of the 2024 exams, pupils are getting more organised and focused for this vital run in for success. In two weeks, we have our University Revision Conference where more advice will be given alongside time to develop the art of revising in the most productive ways. All pupils are different, so a vast range of options are available from online learning such as GCSEPod, afterschool and lunch time revision and techniques such as flash cards and mind maps.

One of the most effective methods of revision comes into play the closer we get to exams, and this is the answering of exam paper questions. Pupils can work with staff to fully understand the expectations of achieving each mark. They can then practise these which creates a familiarity for the final exams.

Each week in the run-up to the exams, parents of Year 11 pupils are sent out a Period 6 and lunchtime timetable alongside the weekly revision calendar. This contains the expected revision to be done by pupils, set by staff. It also lays out what is being taught in class and links to revision work. Next week's examples are below.

In the next week we will also be sending out the link to book onto Easter revision sessions. With over half of pupils booking into half-term sessions we are hoping every pupil is able to make at least one at Easter. The sessions available will be either subject revision or coursework completion.

Well done also to those pupils who completed exams on Tuesday as part of the catch-up mock examination day.

Year 10 pupils received their Progress Update this week which shows current progress towards their GCSE grades. Well done to those pupils hitting and exceeding their targets as well those getting A and B grades for effort. #### **CAREER OF THE WEEK:** Management Accountant

#### What does a management accountant do?

Management accountants play a key role in helping businesses make strategic financial decisions. Many hold a professional qualification such as the Chartered Institute of Management Accountants (CIMA) or the Association of Chartered Certified Accountants (ACCA) designation, which are globally recognised and equip them with advanced skills in business strategy, risk management, and decision-making.



A management accountant's responsibilities might include, preparing and overseeing budgets, helping organisations plan their financial resources to meet both short-term and long-term goals; tracking, analysing, and controlling costs, ensuring operational efficiency, and identifying areas where cost savings can be achieved; generating reports that compare actual financial results to budgeted figures, analysing variances to understand why results differ from expectations; creating financial forecasts based on historical data, current trends, and economic conditions to predict future business performance; providing financial insights to support strategic decision-making by senior management, such as whether to invest in new projects, enter new markets, or cut costs in certain areas; preparing internal reporting for managers and decision-makers; assessing financial risks and developing strategies to mitigate them; improving financial systems and processes to enhance the efficiency and accuracy of financial information.

#### What can I expect to earn as a management accountant?

The starting salary for a management accountant is typically between £25,000 and £35,000 per annum. With experience, this can increase up to £50,000. Senior management accountants can earn over £70,000 per annum, and professional qualifications like CIMA or ACCA, can increase this further. Sectors like finance, technology, and manufacturing tend to offer the highest salaries.

#### What subjects should I study to become a management accountant?

Useful subjects to study include maths, English, economics, business studies, and law.

#### How can I start my career as a management accountant?

There are several ways that you can start your career as a management accountant. You could begin by taking relevant GCSE, A-level, or degree qualifications in subjects such as accounting, business studies, or economics. You could then apply directly to an organisation for a trainee management accountant position, or to a graduate management accountant training scheme. Studying for the Association of Accounting Technicians (AAT) qualification may be beneficial, before going on to study towards your professional management accounting qualifications. If you have studied a relevant degree, you may be exempt from some of the accountancy training modules. It is also possible to complete a relevant apprenticeship to start your career as a management accountant, earning a salary while you learn.

The students were very positive and grateful to Charlotte and her colleagues for giving up their time to demystify some of the myths surrounding work as a lawyer as well as how to become a practitioner.

Charlotte said: "It was great to meet the students. Hopefully we left them with a little bit more information on careers in law than they woke up with this morning. It was nice that they engaged and hopefully a few of them will make enquiries about our work experience schemes with us."







Secondly, some lovely news from Katie in Year 13 who has completed her applications to study Art at university for next year. She submitted her portfolio to the University of Cumbria in Carlisle and received the following feedback from the professor who sent her an offer to study there...

"Thanks for sending your portfolio. The Fine Art staff team here at University of Cumbria were very impressed by your work. In particular, we were struck by the 3D piece with modroc skull inspired by Linda Hofheinz. This is an ambitious and successful piece which demonstrates your willingness to try new methods whilst testing your contextual awareness. Also, it is great to see your willingness to work in both 2D and 3D whilst considering texture, line and surface.

In addition, the drawing of the pelvic bone object or form is a very interesting and striking drawing. Again, this demonstrates your willingness to push the form and materials - and mark-making - towards a very sophisticated outcome. We were also impressed by your gouache painting.

That said, we are delighted to recommend to our Admissions Team here at University of Cumbria that you are offered a place on the BA Hons Fine Art programme. We believe you would be a fantastic addition to our student cohort and we would love to have the opportunity of supporting the next phase of your art practice.








SPRINGFEST


