






We also won a national award for equality in sport earlier this year from the FA sponsored by Barclays Bank and will host the School Sports Partnership Awards for the region next Tuesday evening which is always a special occasion. A huge well done to our PE colleagues and all involved in delivering extra-curricular opportunities – and most importantly to our pupils and students.



Tutor time at Longcroft School is thirty minutes every day; we recognise that tutors are central in both caring for pupils and, crucially, monitoring their progress both academically and socially. Every morning, a form tutor checks in with their tutor group and sets up a strong, positive foundation for a successful day for their group.

Pupils took part in a full timetable of lessons, experiencing first-hand what it's like to study subjects in our specialist classrooms. Miss Sinclair, our DofE Supervisor and Assessor, said: "The pupils began their expedition at Fridaythorpe, camped in Bishop Wilton and finished at Wilberfoss. They walked over 20 miles across the two days."

Miss Sinclair explained: "Their aim was to collect data on biodiversity in the Yorkshire Wolds. Two groups made up our expedition. One group focused on photographing the wildlife they encountered, while the other group collected quantative data on the range and number of each species observed."

Mrs Scott and Mr Davies were our leaders, accompanied by Miss Sinclair.



This week I took Year 12 to the University of Hull to look around their annual UCAS fair. UCAS, The Universities and Colleges Admissions Service, operates the application process for British universities and colleges and is used by all students across the country.

We went to this event because the University of Hull held a fair that many other universities attend to promote their courses. It was a great opportunity for Year 12 students to talk to representatives from universities from around the UK. Thank you to Miss Sinclair, our careers lead, for setting this visit up.

Alongside this, many universities are having their first round of Open Day events for current Year 12 students. It seems early, but their applications will have to be submitted to UCAS by Christmas - which will come around very quickly!

Already, Year 12 students have been visiting Gloucester, Hull, Lincoln, York, York St John, Leeds, Leeds Beckett, Liverpool and Newcastle. In fact, it was Northumbria's open day this last weekend and Ellie, one of our Year 12 students, visited with her family. She's hoping to study Law and is keen to be within touching distance of home - Newcastle is only an hour on the train from York. Ellie told me that, "It was a really lovely campus and the Law School was impressive with practice courts











and a student office where you can have clients of your own in the 3rd Year. Also, they had specific routes if you want to go into being a solicitor or a barrister. So overall the course was practical and impressive. Accommodation was at both ends of the scale, either really gorgeous or more basic, but that's where the cost sacrifice comes in. Northumbria is definitely near the top of my radar."

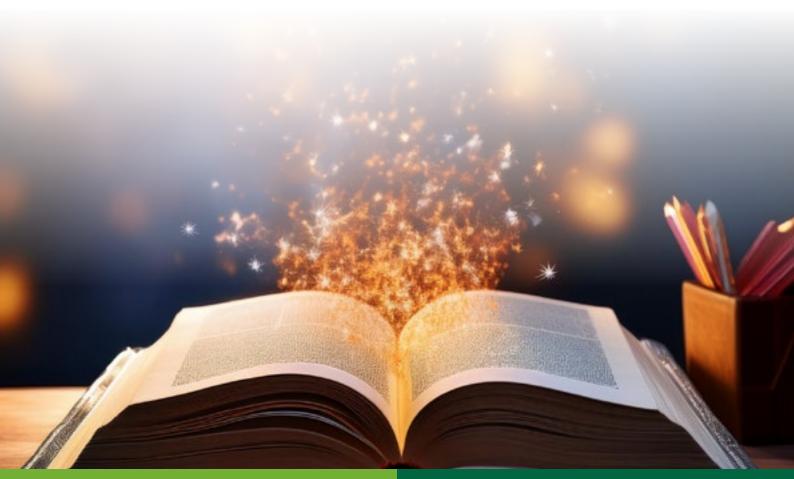

IN FOCUS SCIENCE

Last week Mrs Scott and Mr Davies took our Year 12 Biologists to the Cranedale Centre for a three-day residential field trip.

Mrs Scott tells the story of students' experience.

On Day 1, we went to Wharram Quarry to study the different stages of succession, looking at soil pH, soil depth, temperature, humidity and plant species richness to determine the different series of succession.

On Monday evening we set some live mammal traps, camera traps and pitfall traps which we left overnight to see what we could catch.

On Day 2, we went back to our traps and looked at the voles and mice we caught, as well as reviewing the camera trap footage which wasn't as successful, but we looked through some archive footage of badgers, rabbits and foxes.

We then went to Brompton and Settringham becks to study and compare the index of diversity in two streams. We looked at small invertebrates, including mayfly larvae, freshwater shrimps, caddis fly larvae and most excitingly American signal crayfish. Students were then given the opportunity to hunt for the crayfish at Settringham and look at how the sizes changed along the stream.

In the evening, we used microscopes to investigate the contents of owl pellets, identifying the bones we found and doing biological drawings.





On Day 3, we visited Filey Brigg to look at variation across a rocky shore ecosystem. The students took data to look at the bioenergetics of the organisms, identifying and weighing all mobile species, including some impressive crabs!

We then went back to the centre to evaluate the biomass data collected at each trophic level, along with carrying out RP10 choice chambers using freshwater shrimp. The trip finished with some biological drawings of mayfly nymph.

Students enjoyed the practical hands on experience, and finding some fascinating animals!

Your generosity could make a real difference to a young person's confidence and ability to engage in physical activity.

My vision is to ensure that every pupil feels empowered to participate, enjoy, and succeed, whether through traditional team sports, individual challenges, or newer forms of physical activity. I believe in creating an inclusive environment where all pupils can develop confidence, resilience, and a lifelong love for being active.




Year 9 Rounders Tournament

Hello from the Hub! The SEND **Department Update**


And breathe! A seemingly endless exam season has finally wrapped up with the last of the mocks, and the very fabric of the school appears to release a huge sigh of relief. Focus, rightly centred on the Year 11 pupils for the last few months, has now turned away with one glorious last hurrah and the grandest of goodbyes at their prom.

For the SEND team, it is a time of catch up. A reconnect with the younger pupils and restart of interventions. We have noted and appreciate the maturity, patience and understanding shown by the pupils who have had to work around our re-arranged timetables, but now we're back and excited about resuming our usual duties.

One such important intervention, delivered by Mrs Fleming and Mrs Walker, is EBSA (Emotionally Based School Avoidance). This is a one-toone, six-week intervention, designed to help pupils who struggle with attendance. EBSA is a carefully prepared programme involving discussion and activities. Mrs Walker describes the process as being about building a child's confidence and she focuses her sessions on identifying and addressing specific issues which keep children from their lessons – solving their problems and easing their path back into class. We all want school to be a happy place for every pupil, and for the vast majority we know that it is. Hopefully, with the help of EBSA and the staff who deliver it, we can make it so for everyone.

The team, along with the rest of the school are looking forward to the end of term treats; Games Day and the trip to Flamingo Land, and of-course the long summer holiday, now tantalisingly close, but for one member of the department the holiday promises a particularly exciting and important event. books, including textbooks, fiction, and non-fiction, were all in good condition but no longer used by teaching staff or pupils. Thankfully, they will soon have a new home in Uganda where we are assured they'll be greatly appreciated; particularly the Product Design resources donated by Mr Dyson, and the class sets of Maths textbooks from Mrs Low, that are destined to be enjoyed by teenage Ugandan boys.

To date Books Abroad have delivered over 4,000,000 books to around 4,000 schools and organisations around the world. Projects have included creating libraries in rural villages in Kenya, India, and Madagascar, and supplying primary and secondary schools with much needed books in Gambia, Ghana, and Sri Lanka.

Books Abroad believe in alleviating poverty through education and have transformed numerous lives through their dedicated work. Moreover, over the last 42 years they've prevented millions of books ending up in landfill. Longcroft is very proud to support them.

Especial thanks to staff who assisted with our donation, and Year 10 pupil Luke Hodges, who is doing his work experience in the Library this week and helped with collecting and transporting the books.

STAR Assessments

Last week our KS3 pupils, Years 7, 8, and 9, completed STAR Reading Assessments, as part of the Accelerated Reader programme. This is something they do once every term.



We always stress to pupils that the tests are nothing to worry about. Their main purpose is to help staff personalize learning plans, identify learning gaps, provide support, and see if interventions are working.

The computer-adaptive tests consist of 34 questions, but because they are adapted to the pupil's answers each pupil's testing experience is unique. For example, if a pupil answers a question correctly their next question will be more challenging. If they answer incorrectly the next question is easier. The purpose of the tests are to:

- Measure pupil growth
- Identify learning gaps
- » Inform teaching and support
- Predict performance

STAR Assessments allow teachers and librarians to measure progress in terms of comprehension, vocabulary, and reading skills. Results, which pupils are always keen to hear, are shared with them, their form tutors, and teachers. Parents can email or call the library at any time if they want to discuss their child's reading progress or would like a personalized reading list.

We all know that young people learn to read at different rates. For some it comes so easily, and their reading age may be well above their biological age; for others it might be well below, or very near their biological age. Knowing this allows us to target the right colour coded level of books for pupils on Accelerated Reader. If they face challenges we want to build their confidence and give them support and we have various ways of doing this. In some instances pupils will be invited to work with a reading mentor, join a book Enrichment club, or participate in the Lexia programme.

Of course, encouraging children to read regularly and develop a passion for reading is the best way to motivate them. Please, if you can, take the time to listen to your children read aloud, read aloud to them, talk about what they are reading, encourage them to use a dictionary, or explain any unknown words to extend their vocabulary.


